~ **Reciting a בְּרָכָה with פְּנוּנָה (with care, thought) (2) ~**

When one begins to recite a בְּרָכָה , and particularly when he is reciting Hashem's Name, he should be aware of which בְּרָכָה he is about to recite.

He should not be doing anything else while reciting the בְּרָכָה, for then it might appear that the בְּרָכָה is unimportant to him and that he is saying it thoughtlessly.

It is best to say a בְּרָכָה out loud, because this helps with concentration.

One should not have anything in his mouth when reciting a blessing. This is learnt from the פְּסוּק:

פְּמִלָּא פִי תִהְלֶתֶךָ (תְּהִלִּים ע"א ח)

“Let my mouth be filled with Your praise.” (Tehillim 71, 8)

This means that ה'’s blessing alone should fill a person’s mouth.
